INFORMATION AND REPORTS

1. Update on the Implementation of Senate Bill 1440: Student Transfer

Barry Russell, Linda Michalowski and Paul Feist gave an update on the implementation of SB 1440.

The first 16 Transfer Model Curricula (Administration of Justice, Art History, Business Administration, Communication Studies, ECE, English, Geology, History, Kinesiology, Math, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Studio Art, and Theatre Art) are now in place and there are 5 additional majors in development.

Background was provided: All colleges were advised to develop and obtain approval for at least two TMC degrees by the fall 2011 term. As of mid-December, 99 colleges had met this minimum and 258 degrees for transfer were approved by the Chancellor's Office. The attached spreadsheet was included as a reference document which illustrates the number, discipline areas, and status of all current and proposed transfer degrees. This was not available electronically, so I scanned it for your reference. Unfortunately, the colors don't appear which make it more difficult to read.

Please Note:

- a. Status of priority registration for CCC A/S-T students who apply to CSU colleges, especially for impacted CSU programs, is a continued challenge.
- b. It is possible student transfer statistics for AA-T and AS-T degrees will be included as part of the proposed college "Scorecard" in Student Success Taskforce recommendations.
- c. Colleges can expect to have new targets established regarding the number of additional AA-T and AS-T degrees (beyond the current 2 per college). More details to follow. Jack Scott noted that Senator Padilla (author of SB 1440) is willing to "author legislation to move implementation along..."

2. Student Success Task Force Report

Students and staff filled the large room at the capitol, with standing room only.

Short presentation and the task force members were acknowledged and thanked by the BOG. This was followed by a lively comment period during which a significant number of individuals elected to speak. The comments varied from support to condemnation, and often evoked a response from the large number of students present despite admonitions from the chair.

BOG ultimately endorsed the task force recommendations in their entirety.
